SeaPerch Receives MACHS Alum as Mentor

Miguel Perez (c/o 2013), a former Maritime student, was recently assigned as the mentor from Drexel University for the upcoming SeaPerch competition. For those who did not know, Miguel was a member of the high school team that participated in the national competition two years ago. This year, the Greater Philadelphia SeaPerch Challenge will take place at the end of April, with winning teams travelling to Massachusetts for the national challenge. Veteran help from **Jeffrey Hample (c/o 2013)** has already benefitted the high school SeaPerch team, and this latest support from Miguel could be just what teams need to bolster their chances of winning.

According to the underwater robotics coach, **Mr. Walsh**, the middle school SeaPerch team has been hard at work to prepare for the annual maritime engineering event. So far, five teams have constructed a functioning SeaPerch, and most teams have succeeded in getting their perch naturally buoyant. Additionally, the obstacle course has been built, and the top time is one minute and ten seconds (1:10). Last year's ideal range of time was 0:55-1:10, but this year's additional course challenge may require more time. For now, the teams are currently constructing hydrophones for detecting the SONAR ping that is sent out by the materials that will be retrieved. A scrimmage at LaSalle University will take place on Saturday, March 21st at 9:00 AM.

To better prepare for Miguel's visit and these competition dates, some middle school students came on their day off on Friday to work with Mr. Walsh after professional development. These cadets were also assisted by last year's team member and current 9th grade student, **Helana Magloire**. See below for pictures of their hard work:

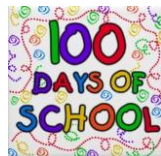


A Few Final Remarks and a Preview for Next Week
